## **Community Forest Update**

Community Forest Agreements aim:

- Long-term opportunities for achieving community objectives
- Diversify the use and benefits derived from the community forest area
- Social and economic benefits
- Environmental stewardship
- Community involvement
- Communication and strengthen relationships between indigenous and non-indigenous communities.

#### Step 1:

Decide on Governance Structure (and partners)

**Partnership** is formed when two or more persons carry on a business with a common view of profit. A **General Partnership** consist of an equal split between the parties. Each part provides equal number of representative. All aspects of community forest operations are contracted out. **Limited Partnership** can be used between local governments and FN. No separate tax returns. Can run the risk of dissolution. Limited obligation for community engagement. If one partner acts outside of the partnership agreement the other partner may have a defense for legal liabilities. Obligation to act in good faith under a partnership.

Example: Cheaskamus Community Forest. Comprised of Resort Municipality of Whistler, Lil'Wat First Nation and Squamish First Nation each have a one-third share. Each partner appoints two directors to the 6 member board. Management and operations is done under the name of an independent non-profit.

**Corporation** is common model for either multiple individuals or an individual entity such as local government. Economic, social and environmental considerations can be put in to it's governing documents. Must file a separate tax return. Local government partners would divide shares between them. Each of the shareholders would appoint a director, usually an elected official, and could also appoint a director at large, a community member. If a board is solely comprised of elected officials there could be a perceived impression of limited community involvement. May also result in radical changes come election time if board of directors have no community members. Hired officer's complete day to day tasks, board of directors sets policies and budgets to guide the officers.

Example: Creston Valley Forest Corporation. Five shareholders including Town of Creston, Wildsight, Erickson Community Association, the Regional District of Central Kootenay and Kitchener Valley Recreation and Fire Protection Society. Each holds 20% or a \$1.00 share. Ten member board, one from each shareholder and 5 directors at large. Full-time forest manager reports to the board on all forestry business.

**Society** is a non-profit organization. Must be incorporated under the Society Act for a useful purpose. Must be organized and operated exclusively for social welfare, civic improvement, pleasure or recreation, or for any other purpose except profit. Can receive tax exemptions. Must have 5 founding members and three directors at time of incorporation. Community Forest Societies can make a profit

from harvesting, but must distribute back to the community. Societies allow for greater access to membership by the community which can bring with it its own challenges. The elected board of directors has the power to hire management and to provide a policy framework for the forest's day to day operations. Public annual financial statements are presented to the board and society members.

Example: Babine Lake Community Forest Society. Shareholders are the Village of Granisle and Lake Babine Nation are equal partners. Two elected officials from each partner and two directors at large from each partner.

**Co-operative Association** is a corporate enterprise jointly owned by members who use its services. Minimum of three individuals or eligible organizations, or combination of both. Can be local governments and First Nations as long as there is at least three. One member one vote, membership can be purchased by those who use the services. Start up capital usually comes from membership shares. To be eligible for tax exemptions a co-op must be organized and operated exclusively for social welfare, civic improvement, pleasure or recreation. Decisions are made by members, day to day operations undertaken by directors who are elected by the membership. Allows for greater access by the community.

Example: Harrop-Procter Community Co-operative. Village of Harrop and Procter. Shareholders are co-op members; all members have 1 share. Eleven directors are elected from membership. Management committee oversees forest manager and office manager.

**Municipality** operated community forests are an extension of normal municipal government duties. The board is the municipal council. Limited community engagement. Transparency is ensured with public access to municipal documents.

Example: Prince George Community Forest. Currently 100% owned by City of Prince George, proposed partners with the city, first nations and the regional district. Board consists of mayor and council will change if other partners buy in. Managed under the Environmental Department at the City.

**First Nations** operated community forests are an extension of the First Nations government. The First Nation holds the license and administration is done under a separate limited company. Lots of flexibility for this model. Unclear if partnership can occur under this model.

Example: Westbank First Nation. Three directors appointed by the chief and council. Heartland Economics LP is a subsidiary of the Westbank Development Corporation and reports to the board on business and operations and to the full council on license issues.

- Need to address financial risks
- What is the reasonable chance of operating successfully from business perspective
- Short, medium and long-term objectives for the business

#### Step 4:

## Management Plan

- Must be submitted with application to the province
- Inventory of the timber
- Proposed AAC
- Management objectives regarding harvesting, management and charging of fees for prescribed products
- Social, economic and broad resource management goals proposed by the Community Forest
- Declares the community's expectations

#### Step 5:

## Forest Stewardship Plan

- Required before harvesting can begin
- Provide result strategies to achieve each of the 10 objectives set by government
- Legally enforceable results or strategies and measures

#### Step 6:

## Map of proposed Community Forest

- Historical description of proposed area
- Environmental considerations
- Cultural considerations

#### Step 7:

#### Application

- Must have Confirmation letter of District Manager
- Community Support
- Management Plan

# Step 8:

## Agreement

Can range from 25-99 years

RE: Request to Improve High-Speed Internet in Rural Communities

The BC Cattlemen's Association is a provincial organization comprised of 56 local and regional cattlemen's organizations. We represent almost 1,200 rancher members many of whom operate in rural and remote regions throughout the province.

There have been advancements in technology and society has grown accustomed to having high-speed internet access at their finger tips at all times. Ranchers face a much different reality. Most areas not have high-speed internet, satellite internet is expensive and often the topography in rural areas limits the signal quality. Cell coverage is also intermittent in rural areas.

At the same time, the province is moving toward a paper-less, digital system for authorizations that affect our daily activities for grazing, water licences, woodlots etc. In some cases, the province isn't even creating paper applications, a good example of this is the recent implementation of groundwater licensing requirements. Ranchers cannot be expected to operate in digital world for their daily business, if they are not given the tools to do so.

Rural resident need high-speed internet access.

There are only a few months left in this decade, let's help the agricultural community move out of the 90s and into 2020 with improved access to internet.

The BC Cattlemen's Association asks the regional district to work to improve rural connectivity and immediately apply for a grant from the CRTC Broadband Fund (https://crtc.gc.ca/eng/internet/internet.htm).
