Re: Risk Assessment of Rail Transport of Hazardous Petroleum Cargo on Northwest BC Rail Corridor

Dear Mayor and Council:

### Request for letter to Transport Minister:

In conjunction with other environmental groups in the Regional District, we are writing to express our concern for public safety and the safety of our watershed given the proposed dramatic increase in shipments of hazardous petroleum products on the Northwest rail corridor. Specifically, we are asking you to write the Minister of Transport requesting a risk assessment under the *Railway Safety Act*.

As you are already aware from previous submissions relating to this topic, Vopak, teamed with AltaGas to build a propane terminal at Prince Rupert . AltaGas is the first propane export terminal on Canada's west coast and it requires 50 to 60 propane tank cars per day. In addition, a second proposed propane export facility is undertaking geotechnical work in Kitimat. Pacific Traverse Energy has received a 25-year propane export licence from the National Energy Board and, if built, will require 60 propane rail cars a day.

As a result of these developments, unit trains of pressurized propane tank cars and other products are now regularly passing through the Regional District along the northwest CN rail line. If all export plans come to fruition, a total of 300 such rail cars per day could be travelling through our region and communities in the future, in each direction.

While the terminals proposed for Prince Rupert and Kitimat will be subject to environmental review, at present there appear to be no plans by senior levels of government to conduct a risk assessment (relating to either environmental impact or public safety) or to review of spill response plans relating to the transport of these products through the northern rail corridor. As the District is responsible for emergency response within its jurisdiction under the BC Emergency Management System (ref. BCEMS Guide, 2016), we feel this issue should be of direct concern to the District of New Hazelton.

As you know, our Society's direct interest in rail safety arose as the result of a 2018 spill by a CN coal train in to Mission Creek at the New Hazelton border. Mission Creek has been the focus of the Society's efforts to restore salmon stocks and improve habitat since our incorporation in 1995. At the time, we observed in our internal discussions that we were fortunate that the spill

was a relatively inert (though still potentially toxic) material and not liquid petroleum products. Then the Vopak/AltaGas and Traverse Energy proposals came along ....

Should a similar derailment which resulted in the coal spill into Mission Creek occur with a petroleum product unit train, it is our understanding that responsibility for planning and implementation of emergency response and evacuation procedures would fall to the District.

For your information, we have again attached 3 maps showing evacuation areas in the Hazeltons which would be affected should a propane, diesel, or methanol spill or fire occur in our area. The potential impact on New Hazelton can clearly be seen in those maps.

For the above reasons, we request that, as elected officials:

The District of New Hazelton write the Honourable Marc Garneau requesting the Ministry of Transport initiate an inquiry under the *Railway Safety Act* of the proposed increase in flammable hazardous shipments on the Northwest BC rail corridor.

This assessment should be conducted before any further increase in hazardous goods traffic. The assessment would need to identify risks and remedial actions for possible adverse environmental effects including spills into watersheds, public safety issues and climate impacts.







Dear Mayor Gail Lowry and Mayor Dennis Sterritt:

Thank you to your delegation for meeting with Minister Donaldson and other ministry representatives during this year's virtual Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) Annual Convention process.

Due to the evolving COVID-19 situation, we have had to develop new approaches and adaptations to many aspects of our everyday life. I thank your delegation for its flexibility with provincial appointments this year and I am pleased that our governments still had the chance to connect.

As Deputy Minister, I am pleased to acknowledge the topics raised during your conference call, which included a community forest agreement.

As you explained, the Village of Hazelton and the District of New Hazelton are seeking a revenue source to help their communities with a community centre proposal. I understand you would like this venture to be a partnership with Indigenous peoples and are also hoping to obtain more timber volume.

As the minister stated, the allowable annual cut (AAC) is set by the Office of the Chief Forester. Once the AAC has been determined, the presiding minister can then make decisions regarding apportionment. A review of the timber supply in your area and resulting AAC determination should be completed in 2021.
